## DEFINITION AND ELIGIBILTY CRITERIA FROM APPENDIX A OF THE MISSOURI STATE PLAN

# <u>Visual Impairment/Blindness</u> <u>Definition</u>

Visual Impairment, including blindness, refers to any an impairment in vision that, even with correction, adversely affects a child's educational performance. The term includes both partial sight and blindness.

## <u>Criteria for Initial Determination of</u> Eligibility

A child displays a Visual Impairment when:

A. A visual impairment or a progressive vision loss has been diagnosed by an optometrist or ophthalmologist:

- B. Visual acuity has been determined to be:
  - 1) for visual impairment, of 20/70 to 20/200 in the better eye with best correction by glasses;
  - 2) for blindness, of 20/200 or less in the better eye after best correction by glasses or a visual field measuring 200 or less.
- C. The visual impairment adversely affects the child's educational performance.
